Two meter net: Gary N4PIR announced that the February net had 17 check-ins, which is the highest number to date, and the next two meter net will be held on March 2, 2017 at 8pm.

<u>EC Report</u>: Gary N4PIR called for the EC report from Marcian Bouchard, KC4TOI, who gave a brief summary of an After Action Review (AAR) of Hurricane Matthew at the EOC. Marcian then passed it over to Cheryl McGuire, KJ4RGP, who said she attended the WebEOC exercise and AAR at the Beaufort

County EOC. She also reported on the P.S. Jones antenna project and the upcoming Eastern Search & Rescue Exercise (Part 1) on March 24-26. The club has been asked to provide manpower for the communications trailer and those interested must register (free) for the event on their website terms.ncem.org/trs/ and type EOC Comms in the comments section. Joe Thackston mentioned he is a trainer certified in Texas for CERT and is looking for CERT activity. Marcian KC4TOI reminded everyone that the ARES net meets on Monday at 7:30 on 3923MHz and about FEMA ICS Classes, AuxComm & ARES and suggested a link that explains what's happening in the general world of amateur emergency services in NC and includes training information http://www.ncarrl .org/ares/training.html. Online classes are listed along with the link to the FEMA website.

The certification is not required for ARES participation but is required for participation in state emergency activities. Beaufort County EOC operates under the Incident Command System and it's good to understand the concepts and speak their language. The Tarheel Emergency Net operates every night; 3923 KHz at 7:30PM. All properly licensed hams are welcome to check-in, and Marcian said he would especially like to see more (or even some) participation from PARC members on Monday nights, which is the ARES night for the Tarheel net. Epilepsy Run/Walk Summary

February 25, 2017 brought the 1st Annual Epilepsy Run to eastern North Carolina. The race was conducted in Washington, North Carolina. The race coordinator James Patterson KJ4CIW contacted Pamlico Amateur Radio Club President Gary Faust N4PIR asking for communications support. After assessing the course Gary thought it best to request additional support from BARC as the longest run was a half marathon at 13.1 miles. BARC members: Bill Dawson* WA4SLC, Al Mullis* K4GOE, Albert Sanchez WA7FXB, Bob Hanrahan AF4QY, Jeff Meyer K4DKW, & Peter Van Houten KG4WEZ in the newly outfitted BARC trailer answered the call. In addition to race support Peter KG4WEZ gave a tour of the clubs new communication trailer after the race. Collaborative support on the part of PARC and BARC helped make the race a success, and members hope to work together in the future when club resources are stretched thin. * Members of both BARC and PARC. James P. Patterson III first started having seizures when he was 5 years old in 1985. As he got older his seizures became more frequent and more intense. By the time he was 17, James was having an average of 25 seizures per day. It was then he decided that he wanted to have brain surgery since his medication was having little to no effect on his epilepsy.

In 1997 James had a VEEG (video electroencephalogram) performed on him at Wake Forest University. During the test James had a tonic-clonic seizure (formerly known as grand mal seizure) that lasted approximately 40 minutes. The doctors and medical staff were able to detect that the seizures were starting in the left temporal lobe of the brain. In the summer of 1997 James had his left temporal lobe and hippocampus removed.

James has been seizure free since the surgery. His side effects from the surgery are: difficulties in expressive communication, weak vocabulary, and difficulties in recalling information (memory). After years of therapy, medication, and counseling; James has adapted to the issues.

While working on his bachelors at Appalachian State University, James started speaking publicly about his disability. He graduated from Appalachian in 2004 and immediately got a full time job providing public service to the community that he still has at this day.

James has spent 5 years volunteering in the epilepsy and neuro ICU at Carolinas Medical Center in Charlotte, NC. James spoke to individuals and

families as an advocate for epilepsy. He had the honor of being a committee member of LUNGSTRONG 15K race in Charlotte, NC for 7 years.

James has been a runner since his freshman year of high school in 1994. Staying physically active (mostly running) has helped him handle the following side effects due to epilepsy: anxiety, depression, and obsessive compulsive disorder. He enjoys running half marathons, marathons, and ultras.

He has a wonderful wife with two adorable dogs they call their children. (submitted through Gary N4PIR)

Come listen to and ask questions of Capt. Charles L. Moore III USN (ret) about his career in the US Navy (and beyond):

A second generation naval officer, Capt. Moore graduated from the United States Naval Academy in 1964 with a Bachelor of Science degree. He also holds an Executive Masters in Business Administration from Farleigh Dickenson University.

A submarine officer and graduate of the Navys Nuclear Power Training, Moore has served at sea in USS *Sam Rayburn* (SSBN 635B) and as engineer officer in USS *Plunger* (SSN 595). He served as executive officer of USS *Fling Fish* (SSN 673) and commanded USS *Ray* (SSN 653) homeported in Charleston. Ashore, Moore served as Assistant Branch Head, Submarine/Nuclear Officer Community Distribution at the Bureau of Naval Personnel; as Current Operations/ASW Officer, Staff Commander Sixth Fleet; as Director of Special Projects (009G), Office of Naval Intelligence; as Deputy Director, US Nuclear Command and Control System Support Staff, Washington DC; and commanded Submarine Squadron 22 in La Maddalena, Sardinia, Italy.

In addition to various campaign and service decorations, Moore has been awarded the Defense Superior Service Medal, four awards of the Legion of Merit, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, two Meritorious Service Medals, five Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medals, and the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal.

Capt. Moore retired from active service in September 1991 and now lives in Cypress Landing of Beaufort County.

Charlie was employed by North American Energy Services as Plant Manager and Operations and Maintenance Superintendent for Cogen Technologys 650MW cogeneration plant at Linden, New Jersey. He joined Battlespace Inc. in 1994 and became Chief Engineer and Vice President for Engineering.

In 2007, Charlie was appointed President, Chief Executive Office, and General Manager for Battlespace Flight Services, LLC. BFS provided maintenance support for the Predator/Reaper weapons system for the USAF Air Combat Command and Special Operations Command worldwide. He retired from BFS in November 2013.
